### Coordinator's Message

March 21 brought League an excellent discussion "Building a Community for Children and Youth in La Plata County". We gained so much, learned so much and can now understand the situation with children and youth here much better. Vicki Coe gave the background piece including the fact that Colorado has the fastest acceleration of children in poverty of all the states! Barbara Dodds presented information about what happens with the young child, the stresses on them, the need for high quality childcare. Marsha Porter-Norton gave the background on It's About Kids, their all volunteer Advocacy Network, and non-partisanship. And, Jaynee Fontecchio-Spradling sparked us with information on becoming an asset builder. It was all terrific and so worthwhile! See page 7 for photo and article.

Now this month, on April 22, a Wednesday morning, we're meeting together as our League to join in a National League Study on the National Popular Vote Compact. Do we want to add to our national policies support of this compact as an alternative way to get to a popular vote of the U.S. president and vice-president? We would leave in place our existing policy adopted in January, 1970 of eliminating the Electoral College and directly electing the President: "The League of Women Voters of the United States believes that the direct-popular-vote method for electing the President and Vice-President is essential to representative government". The new questions to be discussed in April revolve around whether or not to add this second method, (besides amending the constitution to eliminate the Electoral College) to get to that goal.

Therefore, the meeting this month is for our members here in La Plata County to decide, to come to our consensus. This would then be joined with the input from all of the other Leagues in the country to reach a national consensus and establish a national position. The committee has spent many hours preparing the background for the discussion so you'll feel well informed as you make your decision. They will be presenting the information without bias and in fact will be able to participate in the decision. Members of the committee are Suzanne Becker, Beverly Wells, Trish Pegram, Mary Barter, Marilyn Sandstrom, Ann Flatten, Marilyn Brown, Grace Deltscheff, Julie Ward and myself. Hope you'll be able to participate in making our decision for National League consensus -Sally Bellerue

**Health Care Update*****Project Coordinator Hired***

As you will have read in the *Herald*, Julie Thompson, who has loads of the right kind of experience, has been hired by the Health Services Steering Committee (HSSC) on an 18-month contract to review our local health care situation, including studies already done, plus models from other areas, and develop a plan for our community. This is very exciting news. It is hoped that Julie will have a plan or plans ready for consideration sometime later this year. Our League hopes to be actively involved in giving our input to this process.

***Changes at SJBHD - Lend Your Voice***

The Board of Directors of San Juan Basin Health Department (SJBHD) is being replaced by a board consisting of the three county commissioners plus one at-large director from each of La Plata and Archuleta counties. One of the reasons for this is to establish more oversight over the finances of the organization. However, the new board may no longer have any members directly representing the health care communities of either county. There will be a meeting in the Anasazi Room at the courthouse on Wednesday, April 8, at 1:30 pm for public comment. Since public health is such an important component of any community, I suggest that anyone interested attend this meeting.

***Update to the State Nurse Practice Act (NPA)***

SB 239, the Sunset Review of the State Board of Nursing, was submitted to the state Senate Health & Human Services (HHS) committee recently. Along with other updates and changes, the bill adds new requirements for advanced nurse practitioners (APNs) and also gives them some extra latitude, especially in the area of prescribing medications etc. This seems to me a significant move in the right direction, since the availability of APNs, especially in independent practice, enhances access to quality primary care for communities, especially in rural areas. Colorado is currently much more restrictive of APNs than many other states, especially here in the Four Corners, and this update would bring us more into line with New Mexico, Arizona and Utah. This is important, since it will help attract APNs to practice in Colorado.

The bill passed successfully out of the HHS committee, and now goes to the floor of the senate, but there is a faction of the Colorado Medical Society that wants to add further restrictions to the bill before it gets to Governor Ritter. Our state LWV Legislative Affairs Committee is reviewing this bill at their next session, and if they decide to take action, you may be hearing more from me, asking for your help in lobbying our representatives. Of course, we can already do this as individuals.

**Bios of Candidates for Office in LWV of La Plata County****Stephanie Walker Huss (candidate for president)**

I grew up in Minnesota. My mother was a charter member of the Woodbury, MN LWV. I was a politician at Mankato State University until my graduation with a BS in Computer Science and Business. I worked as a systems analyst for 13 years and then joined my husband, Phil, in his business. We lived in Denver for 9 years, then moved to Durango 11 years ago with our two boys. I joined LWV in 2000 and have served as voters service chair, secretary, newsletter editor and on the state board for two years.

**Trish Pegram (candidate for vice-president)**

I was born and reared in rural North Carolina, received a History degree from U.N.C-Greensboro, then my J.D. from Wake Forest U. Law School. After 20+ years as in-house counsel for Wachovia Bank, specializing in employment law, my husband and I retired to Durango 10 years ago. I have a daughter in Albuquerque and a son in Charlotte, and 5 extraordinary grandchildren. I joined the La Plata LWV just a year ago, and have served on committees preparing the National Popular Vote Consensus presentation and studying Mail In Ballot Elections.

**Grace Deltscheff (candidate for secretary)**

I was born and raised in The Netherlands. I met my future husband during his extended European trip and we got married in Amsterdam in 1960. When it was time for him to return to the U.S., I came with him and we settled in Washington, D.C., later in Pennsylvania and in the Houston, Texas area. I was a stay-at-home mom but decided in 1978 to resume my studies and graduated in 1982 with a degree in Accounting and also obtained my CPA certificate. I worked for Texaco till 1998 when my husband and I retired and moved to Durango. Here I joined the LWV and am enjoying the active, non-partisan, approach they are taking to various issues, as well as providing informative programs such as "Great Decisions". It is a great group.

**Nadine Ancel (candidate for treasurer, incumbent)**

I was born and raised in Joliet, Illinois, and received my B.S. in Nursing from Loyola University in Chicago. I lived most of my adult life in northern Virginia, in the suburbs of Washington, D.C. There I worked as a public health nurse for 28 years for the Fairfax County Health Department. My work in maternity health, geriatrics and communicable diseases acquainted me with quite a variety of people and cultures because of the diverse population of the Washington area. I retired in 2005 and moved to Durango. I joined the League of Women Voters of La Plata County in the fall of that year. I was voter service co-chair for 2006-2007 and have been treasurer since 2007.

### **Building a Community for Children and Youth in La Plata County**

The title is daunting. The subject is so important. On Saturday morning, March 21 Leaguers heard from an outstanding panel about our kids in our county.

Vicki Coe, long time League member and activist for kids, moderated the panel. Barbara Dodds and Marsha-Porter-Norton, came to us from It's About Kids, La Plata County Advocacy Steering Committee. Jaynee Fontecchio-Spradling is District 9R Nurse.

**BACKGROUND FACTS:** Vicki gave us the background and perhaps with the most shocking fact: Colorado has the fastest acceleration of children in poverty of all the states! The free and reduced lunch in 9R has increased 36% since 2000. More are in free lunch rather than reduced. She discussed differences in growing up in poverty today and when we were young. Today there are fewer services, fewer positive experiences, not the neighborhood support. These differences affect children physically, emotionally and cognitively, affect kids' emotion and behavior. There is not one cause of poverty.

**EARLY CHILDHOOD:** Barbara Dodds discussed brain issues. If a child is in survival mode and under stress and hungry, the brain does not develop as expected. In the 50s more families were intact. Someone was at home. Now parents are out working. This has had a huge impact on kids. There's a need for high quality childcare. There is funding to improve childcare for 10 years. Training leads to quality providers, which leads

to quality care, which has a positive effect. There's a huge payoff for investments in younger children.


La Plata County now has an adequate number of childcare slots, but not enough care for infants and toddlers. La Plata County Human Services has programs to train, mentor and coach those that would fill the 84 needed slots for in-home care. And, there are programs to focus on the 39 slots needed for in-center care. Head Start will receive stimulus money for cost of living adjustment for 3 ½ to 5 year olds. There are grants coming to mentor those not licensed, e.g., neighbor, grandparent who cares for young children.

**IT'S ABOUT KIDS:** Marsha discussed La Plata County's It's About Kids, one of 12 chapters in the Colorado Children's Campaign, which started in the mid-80's. Its goal is to improve children's lives. It is an all-volunteer, nonpartisan advocacy network. It does advocacy training. In this session of the Colorado legislature it is tracking and supporting bills that affect children. The state LWV, and therefore the LWV LPC, are supporting these same bills, and advocating for kids.

**9R NURSE:** Jaynee taught us "Take 5 to Thrive", to be an asset builder. The thrust is to be a positive influence on kids. A program for 6th to 12th graders in La Plata County encourages a move toward asset-building of youth, which helps focus on positive thoughts and actions. She had us take an asset checklist to see how we compare with students who may be disadvantaged. And, she had a wonderful handout "150 WAYS TO SHOW KIDS YOU CARE", available on many websites by googling the title.

**CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILY MASTER PLAN:** In 2007, La Plata County, Bayfield, Durango, Ignacio and members of the Southern Ute Indian Tribe embarked on an initiative to build a community where all children, youth and families thrive. Over 2000 citizens worked together for a year to create the Children, Youth and Family Master Plan, a roadmap to bring a constructive force, focus and energy to children, youth and families. The four governmental bodies of the three cities and the county have adopted a policy supporting the Master Plan. The Southern Ute Indian Tribe will probably consider a policy soon.
